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Music at Cookridge Holy Trinity

Music is a unique form of communication that can change the way pupils feel, think and act. Music forms part of an individual's identity and positive interaction with music can develop pupils' competence as learners and increase their self-esteem. Music brings together intellect and feeling and enables personal expression, reflection and emotional development. As an integral part of culture, past and present, music helps pupils understand themselves, relate to others and develop their cultural understanding, forging important links between home, school and the wider world.

Music at Cookridge Holy Trinity Church of England Primary School is an academic subject, which involves many skills learnt over a period of time at each individual's pace. Listening and appraising, collaborative music making and enjoyment of music provide pupils with a creative outlet in school. All children are encouraged to listen carefully, concentrate fully and perform the elements of music effectively.

Our Music curriculum is primarily delivered by peripatetic music teachers from 'ArtForms' music and arts service (http://artformsleeds.co.uk/.)

Music in the National Curriculum

"Music is a universal language that embodies one of the highest forms of creativity. A high-quality music education should engage and inspire pupils to develop a love of music and their talent as musicians, and so increase their self-confidence, creativity and sense of achievement. As pupils progress, they should develop a critical engagement with music, allowing them to compose, and to listen with discrimination to the best in the musical canon." (National Curriculum in England: Music programmes of study 2013)

Aims of Music

As a school, our goal is to cover the following National Curriculum aims in an engaging and meaningful way for every child. The National Curriculum for music aims to ensure that all pupils:

- perform, listen to, review and evaluate music across a range of historical periods, genres, styles and traditions, including the works of the great composers and musicians
- learn to sing and to use their voices, to create and compose music on their own and with others, have the opportunity to learn a musical instrument, use technology appropriately and have the opportunity to progress to the next level of musical excellence
- understand and explore how music is created, produced and communicated, including through the interrelated dimensions: pitch, duration, dynamics, tempo, timbre, texture, structure and appropriate musical notations

Subject Content

Planning and implementing the curriculum

Planning is carried out by ArtForm staff in collaboration with individual teachers using the essentials document by Chris Quigley to ensure progression of skills and knowledge. ArtForm staff liaise between each other and the compant to avoid repetition of learning and ensure that all National Curriculum aims are met.

Approaches to Learning

The teaching of Music at Holy Trinity provides opportunities for:-

- Group work
- Paired work
- Whole class teaching
- Individual work
- Work on a whole school basis.

Pupils engage in:-

- Development of pitch and rhythm
- Individual performance
- Performance as part of a group.
- Composition work
- Problem solving
- Musical discussion

Opportunities for Extra Curricular Activities:

Extra curricular activities are available to any pupil who wishes to participate providing they are able to conform to the general behaviour accepted by the teacher. These activities at present include:

- Rounday music (Drum lessons, recorder lessons, guitar lessons, keyboard lessons)
- Music for schools (Woodwind, Brass trumpet)

Assessment

The teachers who are present during music lessons will make on-going, in-formal assessments of the children's learning throughout the session. In cases where ArtForms staff are accompanied by a non-teaching member of staff the ArtForms staff liase and update the class teacher and provide the required assessment information.

Inclusion

All children at Holy Trinity are entitled to a creative and diverse Arts education, irrespective of social background, disabilities, culture, gender, race and differences in ability. We aim to overcome potential barriers to learning, set suitable challenges and respond to pupil's diverse learning needs to ensure that we meet the need and deliver the best for every child.

Equal Opportunities

It is necessary to refer to the School's Equal Opportunities Policy. Boys and girls should be given the opportunity to study and carry out all aspects of Art and Design work included in the schemes of each year group.
